Officers had 5,982 call for service in 2023 (7,413 in 2022). Of these calls, 2,185 were dispatched (2,652 in 2022) and 3,797 were observed trip (4,761 in 2022). The department completed 306 incident reports. Of the incident reports, 8 were agency assists, 97 were Lisbon and 201 were Mount Vernon.

CRIMES AGAINST PEOPLE






COMMUNITY SERVICE
